National Context & Strategic Overview

- Whole family approach within 'Think Family' Agenda
- Multi-agency Steering Group
- Stakeholder/ Operational Group
- Focus on shifting generational patterns of poor outcomes
- Seeks pathways out of poverty, increased employment, reduced Anti-Social Behaviour and crime prevention amongst others
- Joining up of Children's and Adults' Services
- Support into sustainable community provision

Operational Framework

3 strands:

- Parent in prison
 - Risk of eviction due to ASB
 - Adult female first time entrant to criminal justice system
-
- 81 families to be supported during 2010/11 by 13 key workers
 - Average 12 month intervention
 - Focus on Cherwell (OX16), Oxford City (OX3 and OX4) and West Oxfordshire

FIP Funding/ Costings

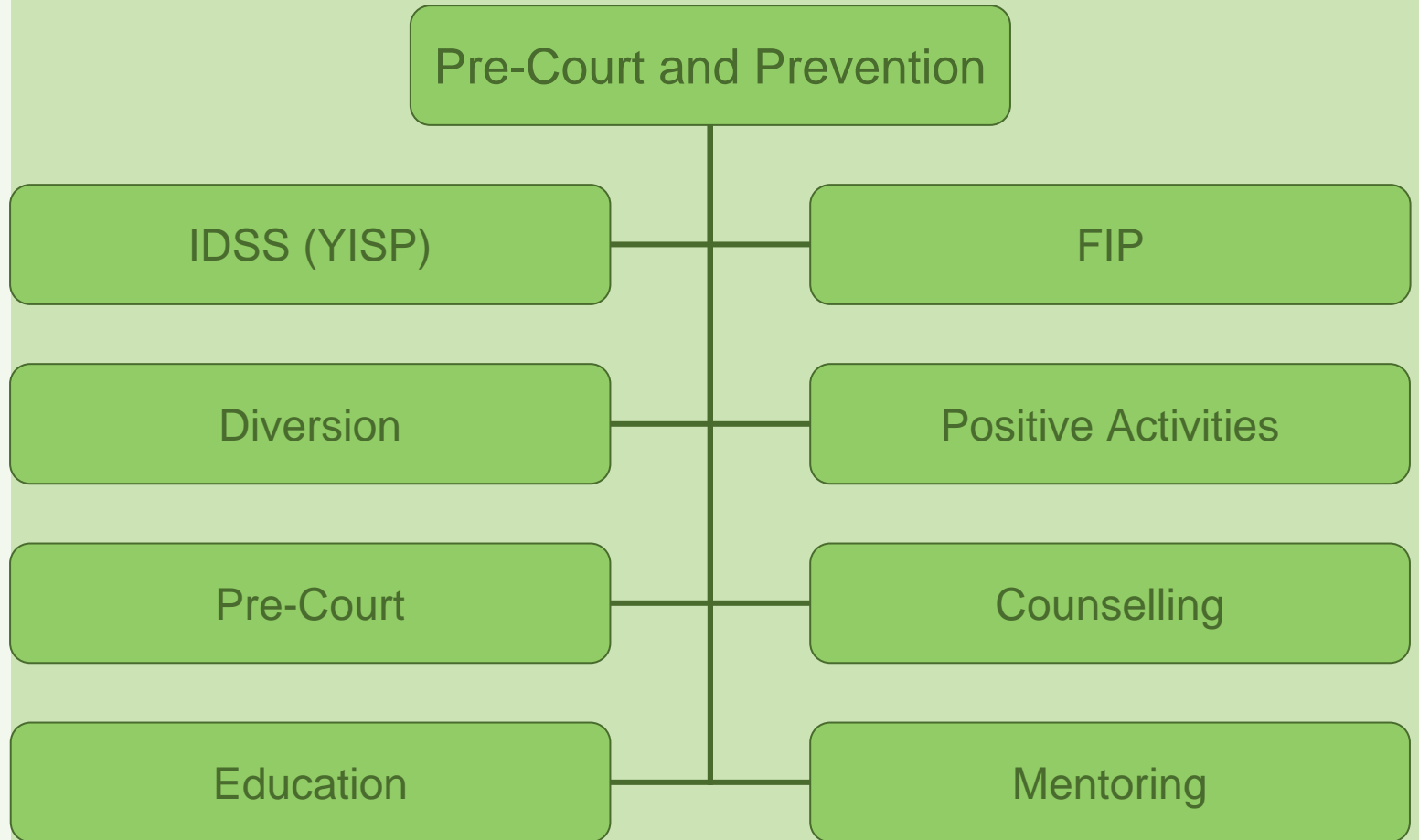
- Total budget of £584,623
 - £461,623 from Central Government grants
 - £100,000 BCD
 - £23,000 DC and Housing Providers
- Average cost/ family £7,500

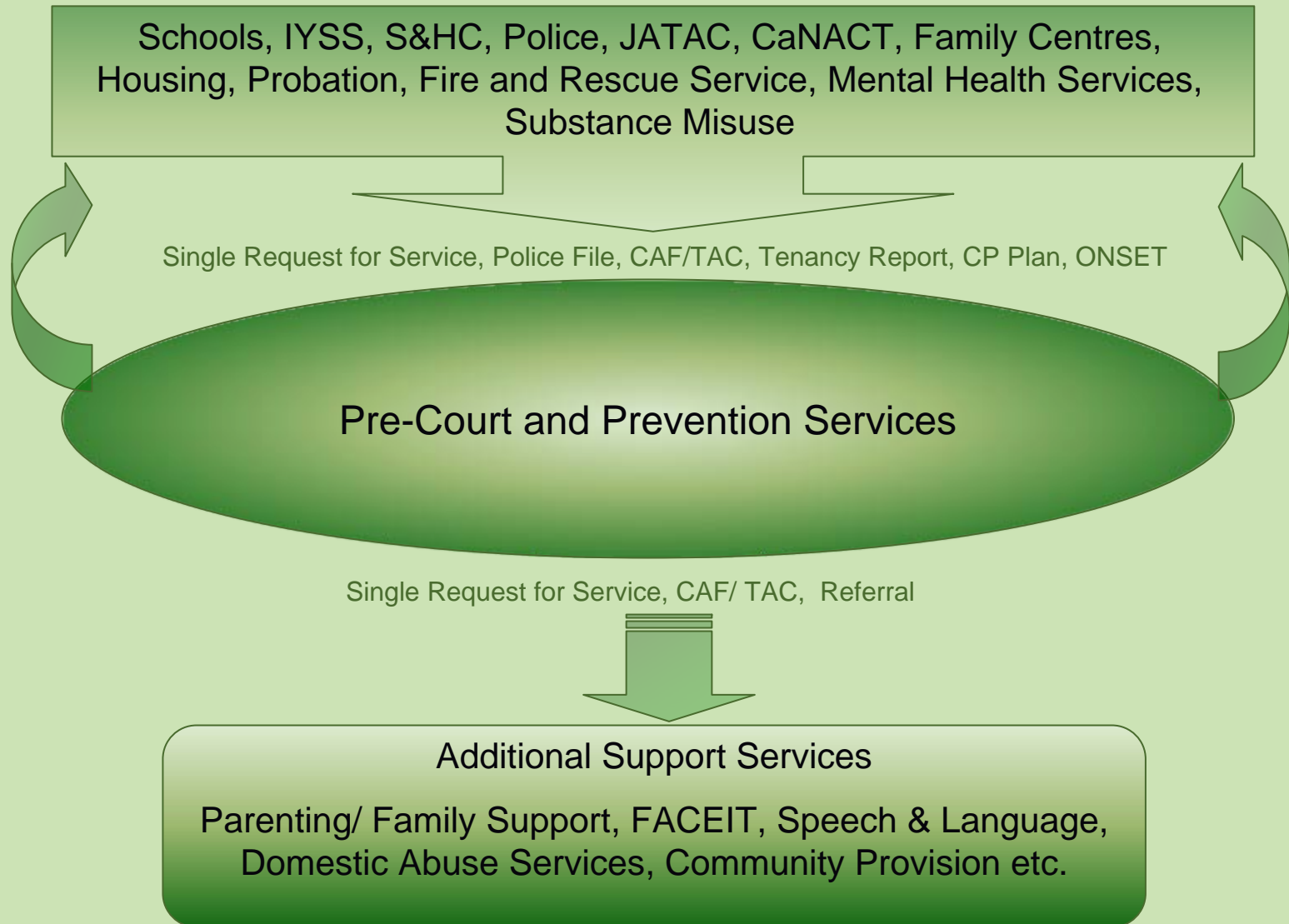
Local Delivery Context



Our Perspective

- Preventative approach necessary to address vulnerability
- Achieving ECM outcomes is the most effective way of reducing risk across the spectrum
- Importance of strong partnership working and multi-disciplinary team
- Offending behaviour, anti-social behaviour and community safety can be addressed through early identification and effective intervention

Outcomes: First Time Entrants

2007-08	1145 (7% reduction)	844 (31% reduction)
2008-09	1079 (12% reduction)	523 (57% reduction)
2009/10		272 (78% reduction)

Prevention Outcomes

- 2.97% offending rate for young people accessing preventative services
- 31% reduction in ABCs/ ASBOs over 3 years in targeted areas
- 55% reduction recorded offences over 3 years
-
- 30% increase in statutory school aged young people in full-time education over 18 months
- 42% reduction in persistent absenteeism amongst Pre-Court and Prevention clients

FIP: Continued Integration

- Draw on existing best practice, partnership working and resources
- Strengthen relationships with other services/agencies
- Coherent strategies between children's and adult's services
- 2-way benefit

L (Daughter, aged 22)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">- Custodial Sentence- Daughter taken into care- Out of employment/ learning- Experienced DA- Substance Misuse
K (Son, aged 15 now 16)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">- Offending behaviour- Substance Misuse- Persistent absentee from school
M (Son aged 7)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">- Attachment issues- No access to community support

FIP: Case Study – 6 months on

Family Member	Presenting Behaviour
S (Mother)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">- Refraining from offending- Abstaining from substances- Engaging with services (statutory and voluntary)- Sustaining employment
L (Daughter, aged 22)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">- Engaging with substance misuse services/ probation- Accessing women's service- Counselling support- Voluntary employment/ going to college
K (Son, aged 15 now 16)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">- Completed YOS Order- No further offending- Improved school attendance and engagement
M (Son aged 7)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">- Developing independence- Sleeps in his own bedroom- Accessing Children's Centre
